# Foster Care Society

Foster Care Society was registered in Udaipur, Rajasthan in January 2017 as a non-governmental organization (NGO). Building on previous work done by Foster care India, Foster Care Society set out to move children from institutions, such as orphanages to individual families.

We believe that every child deserves a nuclear family that can provide him/her needed love and support. Our numbers have increased and now we have successfully placed 13 families in Udaipur and surrounding districts.

Since beginning, Foster Care Society has been working to empower the urban youth, adolescent boys and girls, children and women, elected women representatives, and deprived people of urban slum communities with the help of informed participation and democratic process through various programmes on issues such as health, education, employment, skill development, and maternal and reproductive health.



# OUR MISSION

1. To work from the ground level with the help of families and communities to improve the social development issues related to education, health, family preservation, etc.
2. To associate with the government for better implementation of government rules, acts, and schemes.
3. To promote the better implementation of foster care experiences through best practices and research on the subject.
4. To build, develop, and monitor the movement in Indian Society from non-institutional care as a first resort to Institutional care as the last solution.
5. To create an atmosphere for family preservation, adoption, sponsorship, and aftercare based on government schemes and its promotion.
6. To create an atmosphere in society for eradicating various social issues, provide support in development, and achieving the national and global sustainable goals.

To inspire society to reach optimum developmental standards, by ensuring the best interest of the children without any compromise for families and their communities.



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
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# PRESIDENTS FOREWORD

This year Foster Care Society provided technical support in the placement of one foster child. As a process, Foster Care Society find, fully train and support foster care families to provide safe, stable, nurturing homes for these children who have been abused and neglected. We then support them with quality resources, expertise, and encouragement.

After the success of the first caregiver training in last financial year, Foster Care Society organised the second caregiver training successfully this year. The primary focus of the training was to understand the effect of caregiving on caregivers and to help them minimize the trauma of placement.

Foster Care Society believes that in order to implement effective programs, the work must empower existing systems and be based on the local pulse and situation on the ground. With this objective, Foster

Care Society attended and gave an effective presentation at an onsite capacity building program organised by CRC in collaboration with the Department of Child Rights Rajasthan for the CCIs. And, also attended a state level Consultation on Strengthening Non-Institutional Alternative Care for Children in Rajasthan

As a resource person, Foster Care Society's President attended the National Consultation on Foster Care organized by BOSCO, a NGO in Bangalore and shared Udaipur, Rajasthan's experience on Foster Care.

Parallel to our Foster Care program, Foster Care Society is equally committed to the development of the community people of our work area especially women and children.

For the social empowerment of our community women, Foster Care Society organized capacity building workshops for these women. And to polish the skills of these women free of cost stitching trainings were organized with the polytechnic colleges.

# PRESIDENTS FOREWORD



# PROJECT: SUPPORT NEEDED TO EXPAND FOSTER CARE DIRECT SERVICES, MODEL AND SCALE



Our work in Udaipur is done as a ‘model’ that can eventually be replicated and scaled. As you can imagine, the introduction of foster care has been diligent, intentional and paced as we base our work on the long-term belief of implementation of science-based thinking.


In this financial year, Foster Care Society got a major support from a foreign sponsor; Mr. Bijoy Mohan who provided support to bring change in the lives of children who are in need of care and protection. We are engaged with him in a three year project. The project is named, “Support needed to expand foster care direct services, model and scale”.

We started the project with objectives to

- Spread awareness about foster care through various media and selection of best media as per the current situation.
- Provide orientation and assist with the application process for potential families.
- To monitor and supervise the existing foster families.
- Identify potential children who are eligible for foster care.
- Capacity building of government stakeholders.
- Advocacy work for foster care.

Due to covid-19 outbreak, Udaipur was also under complete lockdown till 30 th May and from the month of June only phase and zone wise activities were started as per the government guidelines. Due to the lockdown and unlock 1.0 restrictions, there have been certain limitations placed on our services, and our team and the project timeline has had to adapt to some changes.

# Awareness



Awareness about Foster Care is a necessity as this concept is relatively new in India. The general population, corporations, non-profits, and even government bodies don't know what foster care is and when explained it takes time for anyone to understand the concept overall. People often confuse foster care with adoption. So, to be able to help the children that are at risk and need foster homes for wholesome growth, it is very important that people are aware of what foster care entails. This way, it can be easier to find potential foster parents, to get people to donate or to fund for the cause, and to work with the government authorities.


Foster care awareness has been rising slowly but effectively through our efforts of spreading information by various media to the relevant government bodies, potential foster families, and the general population. These media include:

- Word of mouth.
- Digital platforms like our website + Social Media- Facebook page, and Instagram page.
- SMS.
- Training and Workshops.
- Information, Education, and Communication (IEC).

With the help of a child protection specialist, content of a concise and sharp message was developed and finalized. In the initial months of this financial year, awareness related SMS were sent to around 21,937 people. But, later the government had put restrictions on SMS service providers in sending bulk messages due to privacy problems. And thus, awareness through SMS has been put to a stop and other media are being explored for the coming months. Realizing the importance of awareness reach, in the next few months Foster Care Society used a new medium and that was radio. Radio reaches a lot of people daily in Udaipur. During the lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic, radio channels reported that people have started listening to the radio more often. Thus, we had decided to go ahead with radios as a medium to do our awareness work and had developed the message that was broadcasted on Radio City 91.9 FM to broadcast foster care awareness information through radio jingles. Throughout the year awareness through sharing our work on social media was ongoing and helped us in getting inquiries also. Apart from this, we also used following mediums to spread awareness about our project:

- Message to concerned government departments
- Child Care Institutions
- Existing foster families

# Awareness



Through these mediums we received good number of inquiries from Udaipur, Banswara, Sirohi and Hyderabad cities (on phone and through email).

In the last quarter of the year, Foster Care Society prepared a concise yet crisp and elucidative IEC material, giving all the details about Foster Care Program and got it printed as a flex banner. The IEC material in the form of banner was officially released through government officials and the banner and pamphlets are distributed to concerned government departments and Child Care Institutions, so that all the associated partners get to know more about Foster Care and Foster Care Society.

Through this banner,

- Officials of CWC and DCPU department have now more clarity about Foster Care rule.
- District Collector got awareness about Foster Care program, which in turn inspired the related departments to work in this field.
- People visiting the Child Care Institutions are asked to contact Foster Care Society for further orientation process.
- Queries regarding foster care program from those who visited CWC office were directed to Foster Care Society.

After the distribution of IEC material, DCPU and CWC directed all the Child Care Institutions to generate a list of potential foster children. These government departments are now more aware about Foster Care and motivating related departments of other districts also and giving them Foster Care Society's reference.



# ORIENTATION AND APPLICATION PROCESS

One of the services that Foster Care Society provides is the orientation of potential foster families and then assisting them with the application process on selection. This is an essential part of our service as these families should fully understand the big step they would be taking in fostering a child and should know what this beautiful but sometimes challenging process entails.

Foster Care Society conducted an orientation for potential foster families who showed interest, explaining how the foster care process works and how we assist them throughout the process through services like case management that we provide.

Then shortlisted potential foster families, whom Foster Care Society declared fit for becoming a foster family, after critically analyzing them through several conversations and doing home visits.

After short listing, Foster Care Society have been supporting these families in the application process by answering all their questions and helping them get their documents ready for submission to the relevant government bodies.





# IDENTIFICATION OF ELIGIBLE CHILDREN

Children are living in institutions who cannot be adopted and even on the streets or unstable homes who might be at risk. These children need to be identified and declared as potential children eligible for foster care so that they can live in a loving family home environment.

In this process, Foster Care Society

- Assisted the government, namely the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) and the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) in identifying and declaring the children eligible for foster care. These children were in children homes/ Child Care Institutions or in families where the parents weren't able to financially support or care for their child.
- Collected detailed information and essential documents of the potential children eligible for foster care by carrying out home visits.
- Collected detailed information provided in the 'Track Child' a portal of the potential children eligible for foster care who were in CCIs by visiting the institution.
- Conveyed the collected information or drafted a letter to convey the collected information to the CWC, DCPU, Specialized Adoption Agency (SAA), and Central Adoption Resource Authority (CARA).

# Child placement



Child placement is the process of matching and placing children in foster care. The placement process is one of the most important steps as it gives the children a chance at a brighter future. Through a detailed and elaborative checking process a foster child is linked with a foster family.

## THE PLACEMENT PROCESS

- The placement process begins when a child is declared to be eligible for foster care placement.
- When a child needs placement, Foster Care Society start with the consultation process with the families that have inquired about foster care as mentioned before.
- The orientation of a family happens in the next step after a family shows interest.
- After our visits and critical analysis, when the parents are deemed to fit to care for the child and Foster Care Society have matched the child with the family, the application process begins for the government stakeholders to do a background check and approve the family as fit for placement.
- The family and child get a chance to meet each other before placement so that the child is comfortable before going to the new family.
- Prior to placement, a tool kit is handed to the foster family with details about the necessary and special points of concern related to the child, about child's daily routines, habits and also the contact details of all the concerned officials including doctor, child line assistance, related Child Care Institution etc., so that they can contact them in case of need.

# STORY #1



This is the story of two foster children, Karan\* and his younger brother, Ram\*. Their father was a washer man and was doing his work near the government hospital. Karan's mother passed away in 2015 just after the birth of his younger brother, Ram\*. Coming from a poor family and as there was no one else in the family, their father used to leave both the children near the hospital premises.

These foster children's father was addicted to alcohol. Being elder brother, Karan\*, had to take care of his younger brother, who was only 4 years old at that time and so he started begging for food and money from the people visiting hospital. Sometimes they slept without food, and sometimes Karan\* was asked to smoke a cigarette in lieu of food. Insufficiency compelled Karan\* not only to beg, but he also started stealing things. And his father used to snatch the money for his alcohol consumption that Karan\* gets from begging and stealing. During the COVID-19 times, the habit of alcohol consumption became so intense that he lost his laundry work.

During COVID-19, food was being distributed daily in the hospital premises by police officers and social workers. One day at the time of food distribution, Karan\* came there to collect food for himself and his younger brother. Both the children were then presented before the Child Welfare Committee and the Child Welfare Committee later took them under their protection. Police officer working on this case was concerned about the future of these children and asked CWC as how they could help these children. To execute this work through legal process, the Child Welfare Committee suggested them to opt for Foster Care scheme. The Child Welfare Committee asked the foster caregivers to consult Foster Care Society.

# STORY #1

Foster Care Society explained them the concept of foster care, its rules and procedure and also the difference between foster care and adoption. During the discussion, the foster family realized that these children are in need of family based care. The foster caregiver agreed that they understood all the rules and are ready to take these children under Foster Care. And they decided to provide foster care and family based environment to these children. After the decision, the Foster Care Society's team did home visit and interacted with all the family members. Biological children of these prospective foster parents were also happy to know that soon two more foster brothers would join them and were ready to welcome them. After the home visit, Foster Care Society observed that the foster caregiver's home and surrounding environment is in the best interest of the foster children and the foster caregiver is capable of keeping the foster children and in improving their future

Foster Care Society's team supported the family in arranging all the documents that were required as per the rules of Foster Care scheme and extended technical support to the foster family and the concerned government departments in all the legal processes involved. Soon the foster family took both the children to their home under the Foster Care scheme!

When these children started their life in the new home of their foster family, some bad habits and misbehavior conducts were observed in Karan\* and Ram\*, such as eating tobacco, using foul language, hiding things, etc., and they started doing all these in their new family.

# STORY #2

Aryan\* was 5 days old when he was sent to Child Care Institution as his mother was incapable of taking care of him. The mother was herself receiving mental health treatment at a care center. So the Child Welfare Committee decided to place the child under the foster care scheme as it was realized that providing a family environment would be beneficial for the child's overall development.

Foster care Society worked hard to find an eligible family that could provide Aryan\* a loving home environment. Foster Care Society shortlisted a number of potential families but most of those families were unable to meet all the necessary requirements for being foster parents. After consulting some potential families, Foster Care Society found a family who could be the right choice for Aryan\*. Foster Care Society explained all the rules, regulations and facts regarding foster care to the family. The family understood and accepted the rules and regulations and wished to proceed with application procedure. This family consists of a husband and a wife and both are working. After visiting the family, Foster Care Society found that these foster parents are having a positive home environment, they have good understanding and are educated and placing the child in this family will be in the best interest of the child.


After assessing all the documents, and reports and after meeting the family, Child Welfare Committee declared the foster family as a fit person. After completing all the process, Aryan\* was placed with the foster family when he was 4 months old and now he could receive all the love and affection from his foster parents. Parents spent maximum time with Aryan\*. Because they both were working, the foster father started working from home and the foster mother went to work only after Aryan\* had his meal and when he takes an afternoon nap. Also, the foster parents hired a full-time caretaker to accompany Aryan\*. After Aryan\* came into this foster family, his foster grandmother also started coming to meet the child and foster parents. The parents are very attentive to his growth and development and are also taking good care of him. Although both parents are working they always make time to be there for the child. Aryan's\* foster grandmother also plays with him and takes care of him in absence of his parents. The child is receiving all the love and affection from the foster family and his overall development is up to the mark according to his age.

## CAPACITY BUILDING OF FOSTER CARE SOCIETY TEAM MEMBERS

To better understand the program details and to get acquainted with the updated information's, a two days online capacity building training from a specialist resource person, Mr. Devashish Mishra was conducted for the project team.

The training was conducted with the objectives to aware, sensitize and give a clear understating about Foster care Program on the basis of the existing Act, Rules, Schemes and Guidelines. And to ensure the family-based care to the needy children, to know the problems of participants and ways to solve them.



## CAPACITY BUILDING OF GOVERNMENT STAKEHOLDERS

Since foster care is a fairly new concept in India, government stakeholders need to better understand the concept and learn or build their knowledge about how foster care can give a better life to children who may be eligible for it. This will allow the stakeholders to function smoothly while thinking about the best interest of the children over a sustained period.

A webinar about foster care was conducted on November 7 th by a board member of Foster Care Society who is also a child protection expert. This webinar was organized in collaboration with the District Child Protection Unit, Udaipur.

A member of the Rajasthan State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (RSCPCR), Superintendent of SAA, members of the DCPU, chairperson and all the members of CWC, a few people in charge of Udaipur district CCIs, and all members of Foster Care Society attended the webinar.

The aim of the webinar was to:

Explain the concept of foster care to all participants in detail.

Convey the importance and the need of foster care; how it can better the life of a child at risk.

Provide and explain the roles and responsibilities of each government body/stakeholder so that foster care work is done smoothly and coherently.

Talk about ways in which the challenges of the foster care process are minimized.

# Advocacy

From time to time, advocacy is needed for child placements in foster care to positively influence decisions in the best interest of the children.

To improve our liaisoning with government departments, in this financial year Foster Care project team visited the following concerned government departments:

✓ As the new panel of Child Welfare Committee (CWC) started its tenure in Udaipur district, so we utilized this opportunity of welcoming the new members of CWC and updated them with our work that is in progress and also, with the detailed information of our Foster Care project.

✓ Project team visited Specialized Adoption Agency-SAA office and exchanged information's about new potential foster families and potential foster children.

✓ Project team also visited Dr. Shailendra Pandya, member of Rajasthan State Commission for Protection of Child Rights and briefed him about on ground works of foster care society, successes and challenges till date, its current and future projects and got positive affirmation of his continuous support. We have been advocating for pushing amendments to Rajasthan & foster care rules and guidelines. In this regard, we had submitted a letter to RSCPCR, asking them to release the amendments as soon as possible. This November the amendments were released, and we have been asked to give feedback on it before the official public release.

# AANGANWADI EMPOWERMENT PROJECT



Another breakthrough for Foster Care Society in this financial year is the opportunity that the organisation got through a project to work with 100 children of total 4 Aanganwadis in urban slum areas. And so, various Aanganwadi Empowerment Programs were organised under the auspices of Foster Care Society and Trent Ltd. Star and Diya 2020 Project. Foster Care Society's mission is not only to move away from outmoded institutions, but also to provide individualized and community based supports to keep more families together. To promote that, on May 1, 2018 we opened our family support centre "ParivarSahyog Kendra" in order to empower families and prevent family separation. The approximate population of Udaipur is 5 Lakh, in which the average population ranges in each ward between 2000-2500. There are 21 Slum areas in Udaipur with an average population of 1 lakh. The male population in these slum areas are mostly wage labourers and women do household chores in other homes. They are very low in financial and social and educational status. Most of the women in these areas are widow, abandoned and separated, who are not capable to take care of their children. Foster Care Society started working on this project with objectives to:

1. Improve health and nutritional status of children of age 0-6 years;
2. Lay the foundation for appropriate physical, psychological and social development in children;
3. Work towards reduction of mortality rate and cases of drop outs, illness, and malnutrition
4. To promote child development through effective coordination between different departments for the policies and their execution.
5. Capacity building of mothers by giving them awareness to take care about their general health and nutrition related needs through proper nutrition and health education.

This project started with meetings with ward panch, Aanganwadi workers, sahayikas and community women and status assessment of 4 Aanganwadis. Various activities were conducted throughout the year for the betterment of the community women and children. These activities included -

# LEAD MOTHER TRAINING

In the month of October, 32 "Lead Mothers" from 4 Aanganwadis of urban area were given necessary and useful information's in a training session related to child development and malnutrition among children.

The second training session of Lead Mothers of 4 Aanganwadis was conducted in the month of December. This session was conducted through an online meeting, given the circumstances of COVID-19. This training session gave information about how mothers should take care of themselves during pregnancy.

Women were informed about various aspects of Aanganwadi registration, diet and nutrition, regular check-up's, vaccination etc.



# MENSTRUAL HEALTH, HYGIENE AND HAPPINESS FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS

Talking about menstruation has been considered a taboo in our society for ages. In our country, with restricted or almost no source of information and guidance, millions of young adolescent girls continue to suffer physical and mental stresses related to puberty. This is primarily due to the reluctance and hesitation to approach the subject openly in most parts of our country. In order to empower girls with knowledge and awareness about this natural phenomenon, “Foster Care Society” organized a three days training program on “Menstrual health, hygiene and happiness for adolescent girls”.

This training was taken online by Pavitra trainer, Mrs. Suprita Paneesh from Project Pavitra, Indore, in which 31 girls participated. The topics on which detailed discussions were held included growing from childhood to adolescence, puberty, female reproductive system, menstruation, menstrual debate, balanced diet and menstrual problems. During this time, girls also learned various Yoga asanas and on the last day of training, Mrs. Karuna Jain, Gynecologist from Indore resolved a lot of queries that these girls had.



# FREE MASK AND HYGIENE KIT DISTRIBUTION



In an Anganwadi Empowerment Program organised under the auspices of Foster Care Society and Trent Ltd. Star and Diya 2020 Project Support, free of cost masks and hygiene kits were distributed to 30 children of age 3 to 6 years registered at the selected Anganwadis of ward number 13-14, at Kishanpole First Anganwadi and Kishanpole Farashkhana. The kit included mask, hand wash, soap, handkerchief, toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, oil, nail cutter and tongue cleaner and free of cost masks were also distributed to the mothers of children. Again in the month of February, free of cost masks and hygiene kits were distributed to 12 children of age 3 to 6 years registered at the selected Anganwadis of ward number 50, at Naio ki Talai Anganwadi. The kit included mask, hand wash, soap, handkerchief, toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, oil, nail cutter and tongue cleaner and free of cost masks were also distributed to the mothers of children.

# WOMEN EMPOWERMENT



## Certificate distribution

For almost 4 years, the “Family Support Center” run by “Foster Care Society” has been dedicated to the empowerment of financially deprived and single mothers and even in this difficult time of COVID-19, we have given priority to this objective.

A new group of 30 women was once again provided 6 months of free sewing training in joint aegis with Vidhya Bhawan Polytechnic College under the “Community Development through Polytechnic Scheme”, sponsored by the Government of India. These women not only learned how to make different sewing products in this training program, but during this difficult time they also earned income by selling cotton masks. A certificate distribution ceremony was organized by Vidhya Bhawan Polytechnic College to commemorate the successful completion of the training program for these women.

## Income generation

During this tough time of COVID-19 pandemic, we came with more useful products by adding some new things to the range of great products being made by the women of the community. These comfortable and cotton cloth masks and hair bands (scrunchies) and cotton overcoats were definitely a reliable and helpful purchase. The continuous orders and the amount received from them was a big reason for the women of the community to be self-reliant and for their encouragement.

# Community support



## Pulse Polio campaign –

Foster Care Society & Centre coordinator along with the Aanganwadi worker helped in giving polio drops to 36 children in the selected Aanganwadi areas under the pulse polio campaign in the month of February.




## Linkage with pension scheme –

With the support given from Foster Care Society, in the month of December, a handicapped and widowed mother successfully got her child connected to the Widow Palanhar Yojana, one of the various schemes run by the Department of Social Justice and Empowerment. Biometric verification of the girl child was done in Badgaon Tehsil with the help of Foster Care Society and now the girl's name has been linked to the Palanhar scheme and from February 2021, the girl child started getting a fixed amount per month for her studies.

Earlier also, with the help of Foster Care Society, this mother's disabled pension that is given by the government was started.


# CLOTHES DISTRIBUTION -


# Baby shower ceremony -
